

Business Manager's Report

HERE'S TO 2023

Brothers and Sisters of IBEW 440,

I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season with your loved ones and that 2023 has started off happy and healthy for you. Looking back on 2022 we had a fantastic year for work in the Local. 2022 was another record year for the Local with regards to man hours. We worked 2.3 million man hours in 2022! Thank you to all the Brothers and Sisters of Local 440 and the Travelers for manning all the work we had over the last year. Looking forward into 2023 we can expect much of the same when it comes to work. We will continue to see solar and battery storage all throughout Riverside County. Aside from the projects that are currently going on in the desert you can expect a few more to start the second quarter of this year. Desert Quartzite located in Blythe next to the Athos III project is a 376MW project starting in April and will be performed by Blattner Energy. We also have 3 storage projects starting around April. We have SOLV Energy doing a BESS project in Desert Center, Mortenson will be starting 2 BESS projects in April. The first project is Beaumont BESS which is a 100MW storage project located in Beaumont and the Calpine Nova BESS project which is a 684MW storage project located in Romoland at the site of the old power plant our Local built in 2007 – 2008. You can also expect to see calls coming in for the hospital tower going in at Kaiser Riverside. That project is expected to have 150 electricians at peak.

In 2023 we are taking our first big leap in marketing our Local and brand throughout Riverside County. We are the best electricians in Riverside County and it's time we start highlighting and sharing the work each of you do and the benefits provided by being a part of a Union. With the completion of the Arcisure Arena in Palm Desert I am proud to share that we are a Corporate Sponsor of the AHL Coachella Valley Firebirds hockey team. They are an affiliate of the NHL Seattle Kracken. This is the first time we have been in partnership with a professional sports team. You will see our ads on the marquees outside the hockey arena as well as all throughout the building during hockey games. We will also have radio and T.V. ads running when the games are aired. Through this partnership we will be setting up events for our members and their families. Some of those events will include a Union night at a Firebirds game and a family skate day at the Iceplex. We are excited about this partnership and the exposure it will bring to our great Local. Through our LMCC we are also exploring opportunities in marketing on radio and digital platforms through a partnership with KCAL/KOLA radio, as well as exploring options for T.V. commercials through KESQ, the ABC station affiliate in Palm Springs. We have been the best kept secret for far too long and now is the time to start letting everyone know who we are and what we can provide.



Later this summer we will be entering into contract negotiations for our Inside Agreement. It's crazy to think that it has already been 4 years since our last negotiations, yet here we are. In the near future, you will be hearing from President Luther announcing Town Hall meetings



for our upcoming negotiations. These are informal meetings for Inside Journeyman and Apprentices only, to come together and share their ideas for contract negotiations. I encourage everyone to read through your agreement and highlight anything you want clarification on, or if you have an idea to change the agreement, bring those ideas to a future Town Hall. In the 4th quarter of 2022, we wrapped up negotiations for our Sound classification. We were able to secure the largest contract raise for our Sound unit. We got \$9.45 over 3 years for this contract. On December 9th, 2022, we had a wage allocation for the first 2 allocations on the new contract. They allocated the first \$1.55 as follows: \$1.00 to the check and \$0.55 to the healthcare. For the healthcare, \$0.32 was needed to maintain our benefits and the additional \$0.23 was used to establish an HRA card (Health Reserve Account). For the second \$1.55 allocation that takes effect in June they allocated it as follows: \$1.05 on the check and \$0.50 to the DC. Overall, we secured a great contract for our Sound division. Still on the topic of negotiations, we will begin to start negotiations for the CE/CW agreement come March, so be on the lookout for updates.

We have a lot to look forward to in 2023. As we start a new year and make resolutions, I would ask each of you to make a commitment to be more involved, attend meetings and volunteer because imagine the impact we could have on our jurisdiction and our Union if everyone committed to just 2 things a year. The impact would be massive. We are only a strong Union if our members are strong in solidarity.

As always remember to be vigilant, be safe, and take care of one another.



They have never worked under a CBA or bought power tools, conduit benders and Personal Protective Equipment for their employees. These are often long and tedious relationships, and this is why when I have had brothers and sisters call about becoming a contractor I highly encourage it. My thought process is that a member has grown up under a CBA and understands it and should know what they expect from a contractor.

In December, we had our 2nd Annual Off Road Club Event. I would like to personally thank Jesus Sanchez for stepping up for this event. He not only purchased, prepared and cooked the food for this event, but he also advertised and coordinated until the day of the event. This event is getting bigger and better every year. The Off Road Club only holds the one annual event, but if you go to the Facebook club page members are always posting where they are going and inviting others to join. The other club I am involved in is the Softball Team. We are starting a new season at the end of January on Friday nights at Big League Dreams in Perris. The beginning of the year also brings us that time of year when we start doing hands-on testing for our current members

Taking this assessment test will let our members know if they are ready for an Advanced two year program or full five year program. We will be testing every weekend in January, February and March. I would also like to thank our Examining Board for taking the time to administer these tests. We ask a lot of them and they take on this duty for our Local with pride and dignity. They are essentially the gatekeepers for our next generation coming through the ranks. They share their journeys of how they became an IBEW Local 440 member and welcome them into the apprenticeship program. We at Local 440 would like to thank Juan Barreras, Juan Dominguez, Alan Langley, Evan Thompson and our newest board member Robert Valdez. We would also like to give a shout out to Jeremy Floth for being there to help set up and maintain our testing facilities.

In the upcoming months we will be attending an IBEW/NECA benefits Conference in Florida and a Business Manager's and Organizer's Conference in Las Vegas. These conferences help us keep up to date on information for our members and for tactics for organizing our jurisdiction. I look forward to bringing home as much useful information as possible.

Jim and I had the pleasure of meeting with Sheldon Kimber and Michael Wheeler, from Intersect Power. The vision they shared for green energy and Organized Labor was one of those motivating conversations that help us as Organizers continue to march on. I encourage everyone to look up Sheldon Kimber and/or Intersect Power on various podcasts and hear it for yourselves. We hope to have these types of relationships open new doors and create better opportunities for our Local.





I wanted to highlight some of the effort and results of the Inland Empire Labor Council from the November 2022 election.

Below is a Campaign Summary for the Inland Empire Labor Council:

Volunteer Dates: 28 Volunteers: 426

Engaged Affiliated Unions: 12 Doors Knocked: 15,098 Phone Calls Made: 13,848

Endorsed Candidates: 71 Win:41 Lost:29

As you can see, we had some wins & some losses but overall the momentum of the Inland Empire Labor Movement is continuing to grow with each election cycle. I hope to see more of our members engaging in these efforts in the upcoming years.

Gains:

Dr. Xystian Gutierrez - Won his race for Riverside County Board of Supervisors - District 5. This a great win for Labor. Dr. Gutierrez is advancing from his previous position as Mayor of Moreno Valley. During his time as Mayor, he championed a PLA across the finish line for the Building Trades. He is an ideal individual to move onto the County Board of Supervisors to represent us. Many of our Large Industrial Scale Solar projects must go through an approval process with the County Board of Supervisors and having a friend of labor in these decision-making positions are invaluable.

Cheylynda Barnard - Won her race for Moreno Valley City Council - District 4. Chey is a union member of SEIU, a Social Worker, Delegate & Executive Board member of the Inland Empire labor Council and labor advocate to her core. Chey's presence on this council helps us keep the labor friendly majority we already have on this board.

Mark Takano - (Incumbent) - Won his race for Congressional District 39. Mark held his election night watch party at our IBEW #440 Hall in Riverside. It's always an honor to have a longtime friend of labor in our house of labor on a winning night.

Grace Garner & Ron DeHart - Both won their races for Palm Spring City Council. Grace in District 1 & Ron in District 3. These 2 candidates help us again keep a majority labor friendly board in a city we have recently been successful at getting a PLA signed in.

Losses:

Christy Holstege - Lost her race for Assembly District 47. This was a hard loss for labor as she only missed it by 85 votes. Christy is currently on the Palm Springs City Council & during her time in this position she championed our efforts to get a city-wide PLA. During Covid-19 she also fought to get "Hero Pay" for all the grocery workers in her city. Christy has a great understanding of the value labor unions bring to workers, this is why she worked to help secure a LPA (Labor Peace Agreement) for all Cannabis Workers in Palm Springs, promoting organizing efforts & encouraging these workers to unionize. Christy is exactly the type of candidate we would like to see move up from local leadership into a state representation.

Aurora Wilson - Lost her race for Desert Community College District - Trustee Area 4. This is the board that oversees College of the Desert. As we push to have a presence in the Coachella Valley we are prioritizing the pursuit of a CWA (Community Workforce Agreement) in the upcoming years. College of the Desert is one of the larger influences over everything that goes on in the CV, so this makes it a prime target. We need to work to get a majority of labor friendly board members prior to any pursuit of policy.

WHY DO UNIONS HAVE THIS IMPACT?

Union members, just by virtue of being in a union, have the opportunity to engage in activities that directly mirror electoral participation. There are elected positions at the shop, local, state federation, central labor council, regional, and national levels that members vote, run, and participate in. They attend meetings where their viewpoints are expected to be heard. They attend conventions, and the delegates to those con ventions must be elected. They vote on contracts. Members are educated on issues of importance to the union and working people. They're encouraged to reach out to elected officials and lobby. Organizing drives build leadership, communication, and a sense of solidarity, including among workers who don't otherwise know each other. All of these things and more quite evidently would prepare someone-and give them the skills, confidence, and sense of empowerment and efficacy—the sense of a VOICE—to participate in elections. Research has shown that participation in organizations, and in unions in partic ular, increases political sophistication and interest. Belonging to a labor union means one is involved, at least on some level, in union and workplace affairs. Selecting members for leadership positions and voting on proposed wages and contracts are both examples of political participation in the workplace . . . use of these political skills translates beyond just the workplace and increases a member's likelihood of becoming involved in the political pro cess and, ultimately, voting.34
