Business Manager's Report

Brothers and Sisters,

I hope this newsletter finds you and your loved ones happy and healthy to start 2024. With the start of the new year, we start with a new CBA for the Inside classification and new wages for all journeyman and apprentices. As is typical with the holiday season we have seen a bit of a slowdown to start off the beginning of the year. We do not anticipate that to last long though with some large projects starting in the first quarter of 2024. We have already seen a couple of calls go out to the East Valley Metropolitan District expansion project located in Lake Elsinore. This project is being performed by Shimmick Construction and is expected to run for approximately 3 years. The hospital tower at Kaiser Riverside is set to get going this quarter as well. This project is being built by Morrow Meadows and is projected to go into 2026. We also have some school work that recently broke under our community workforce agreement in Riverside Unified School District. We have a ground up school, Casa Blanca Elementary, being built by RIS Electric and a campus expansion at North High School being performed by Daniels Electric. For other local work that is slated to start around summertime we have the Riverside University Health Systems Behavioral Health Village located in the Perris area. This project will consist of five 2-story buildings and a parking structure. The work on this project is being performed by Briggs Electric and Anderson and Howard. This project was a big win for our Local. Projects that Riverside University Health Systems has built in the past are typically done with Berg Electric. This project is projected to run for approximately 2 years. For those under the Sound and Communications classification you can expect to see calls to these projects listed above. As it relates to future work in Zone B, although we have work covered under CURE PLAs, as of now we do not expect any of these projects to break ground this year.

When I took over as Business Manager back in 2019, we started earmarking a portion of our working dues to put towards a new Hall for the Local. In our Local's 85-year history we have never had our own Union Hall. We have always shared spaces with other Labor Organizations, which for a long time made sense because we were a small Local. With our membership's growth over the years comes the need to have a place to call our own, to better serve the membership, and set the Local up for future growth and success. We are proud to announce that on January 20th, at a special-called meeting, the membership voted to move forward with the purchase of a new Union Hall. As I write this newsletter, we are currently in the process of purchasing the property. As in everything we do, please know that the purchase of this property is not guaranteed until we close escrow. We are excited that the membership had the foresight to see the need for a new Hall. Once we finalize the purchase of the building, we intend to put together a building committee made up of members to assist with the vision and design of the new hall.

As a part of the January 20th special-called meeting to discuss the new Hall there was a lot of discussion surrounding a new JATC for our Local. There were many in attendance that wanted to see a new JATC before getting a new Hall. I want to clarify to those that share those same concerns but were not in attendance at the meeting. When we were first looking at properties for a new Hall, we had this grandioso idea that we were going to buy a large enough building to house the Hall and JATC in one building. In doing our due diligence we discovered that we are not able to do that, and if we were able to it would not be a financially sound decision for the parties. The Hall and the JATC are

two separate entities with their own monies and assets. Per the DOL and ERISA we legally cannot use any of the Hall's money for the benefit of the JATC, nor can the JATC use any of its money for the benefit of the Hall. In looking at all options we decided that it was best and cleaner for both organizations to move forward separately. Because we are moving forward with a new Hall does not mean that the JATC is not a priority. I can assure you that moving forward with a new JATC is a top priority for us and we are working on it as we speak. Our membership deserves to have our own state of the art JATC right here in Riverside County and we will work to make that happen, just know this is not something that happens overnight.

As we start 2024, I want to encourage each of you to attend Union meetings and Union events throughout the year. We are only as strong as our membership is. Here is to a great 2024. As always be vigilant, be safe, and take care of one another.

CW & CE upgrade hours are accepted during the months of:

MAY AND DECEMBER

Processed: June and January **Reflected:** July and February

Hours Sheets & Classification Upgrades

CW's and CE's are required to turn in hours work sheets at the end of each semester to be eligible for classification upgrades. Hours will be cross referenced and those who have obtained the required hours for their upgrades will reflect once processing is finished.

Our CW's and CE's are required to attend class via Zoom one night a week to maintain their Electrical Trainee Card (ET Card) through the Division of Industrial Relations. To maintain your ET Card and be eligible for employment they must attend 150 hours of schooling per year with a passing grade. It is the CW and CE's responsibility to renew their ET Card at the hall prior to expiration. It is free to renew if not expired, if expired it will cost \$25.



The FIRST Object of the IBEW

When we look at an IBEW constitution we see 11 "Objects of the IBEW", a lot of you are familiar with these objects and even know the FIRST by heart, but I'm sure we have some of our rank and file that aren't familiar with, or aware of our documents such as our Local 440 CBA, Bylaws, Wage Bulletins, and our IBEW constitution. So, to recap, and for those that are just learning, the NUMBER ONE object of the IBEW is "To organize ALL workers in the entire electrical industry in the United States and Canada, including those in public utilities and electrical manufacturing, into local unions."

In 1890, JT Kelly & Henry Miller met with AFL organizer Charles Kassel and created Local 5221, a union solely for St. Louis electricians. By September of 1891, they felt confident in calling for a convention to establish a national organization for electrical workers. We should all be familiar with

the date Nov. 28th, 1891, because you see it on EVERY IBEW Bug we put on our lunch boxes, hard hats, toolboxes, vehicles, tattoos etc. With only \$100 bucks, thanks to a loan from Local 5221, Brother Miller hit various cities jumping from rail car to rail car, and within the next 6 months chartered 45 local unions, to our then NBEW. We were



the National Brotherhood of Electrical Workers before Canada was included a couple of years later, then making us the INTERNATIONAL. (Source credit: The Electrical Worker Online – "Remembering Henry Miller")

Upon returning from our Membership Development conference in September 2023, the organizing crew of Local 440 came back ready to do OUR part to fulfill the number one object of our great Brotherhood. We set an ambitious goal of contacting EVERY person in our jurisdiction doing electrical work. I think there is some stigma around organizing from current IBEW members, a sense of fear and entitlement, which asks the question – if we organize all these workers won't that mean less work for us current members. Though that is a fair question, we must remember the spirit of our cause. So, as We the "organizers" talk about large ambitious goals of organizing EVERY electrical worker in our jurisdiction. Please don't take that as we are going to bring them all into membership tomorrow. Remember "Organizing" should be us extending our hand, informing them of their rights, and opportunities, ensuring that they are treated fairly and aware of how WE as Tradesman are in this fight together. And if they are genuinely interested in being part of us, then we hope they feel welcome and are willing to do the leg work to make membership and be given the opportunity to swear the oath we all have.

Around early December we sent out a welcome/informative post card to 1200 certified electricians in Riverside County. On January 6th, we knocked on 334 of their doors to follow up on the postcard and the invitation to our upcoming Industry event. Over the next few weeks, the available staff hit another 300 doors, inviting certified electricians, spouses, family, friends or whoever answered the door to our Industry event. On Saturday, January 20th, while 95 or more 440 Brothers and Sisters were at our hall discussing the future of our Local's address, the organizing department of 440 was at the Moreno Valley Community Center welcoming 52 tradesman & 10 spouses that signed in, along with a few who chose to not sign in. It was a great event, lots of contacts were made and information shared. We still have close to 600 doors to hit as we prepare to complete this action. We also have over 3000 workers in our jurisdiction that are not certified but do hold an Electrical Trainee card or are an Indentured Apprentice. Over the course of time, we WILL be approaching ALL of them in some capacity, whether it be by postcard or door knock, we will be getting them the information they need so they can see and know that the IBEW IS the way to go. If you are interested in participating in any of this, PLEASE reach out to any of us at the hall.

From Apathy to Activism, through Brotherhood we WILL change the world or at least Riverside County!



We will be working on water treatment plants, hospitals, some solar, battery storage and multiple residential and commercial projects. We will keep on organizing in every aspect of the word. Recently we had a conduit class where many believed that we were going to teach conduit bending. all-in-one rigid threader, and we used the pony threader to teach individuals what is out there in the field when the rigid threader is not available. 




